Mission: “To preserve and share Oberlin’s unique heritage and to make our community a better place to live, learn, work and visit.”

History: The roots of the Oberlin Heritage Center date back to the Oberlin Village Improvement Society, founded in 1903 by a group of concerned citizens to beautify and improve the town, and the Oberlin Historical Society, organized in 1960 to preserve the Little Red Schoolhouse and the Monroe House. The two volunteer groups merged in 1964 as the Oberlin Historical and Improvement Organization (O.H.I.O.). The organization has grown tremendously since hiring two professional staff members in 1993, Pat Murphy (Executive Director) and Mary Anne Cunningham (Assistant to the Director). In 2005 the organization was renamed “The Oberlin Heritage Center.” (It retains Oberlin Historical and Improvement Organization as its legal name). Today, the Oberlin Heritage Center is accredited by the American Alliance of Museums and is widely recognized as a model small museum, historical society and historic preservation organization. It offers educational programs and special events both at its complex of historic sites and throughout the community, often in collaboration with other organizations.

Governance: The non-profit 501(c) (3) organization is governed by an 18-member Board of Trustees. Officers include President Nicholas R. Jones, First Vice-President Robert B. Calhoun, Second Vice-President Gail Wood, Secretary Ken Grossi and Treasurer Edward J. Wardwell. The organization’s strategic plan is available upon request.

Facilities: The Oberlin Heritage Center includes the historic Monroe House (1866), Jewett House (1884) and Little Red Schoolhouse (1836-1837).

Tours: Guided tours of the three sites of the Oberlin Heritage Center are offered on a walk-in basis on Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday at 10:30 a.m. and 1:30 p.m. Guided “Sneak Peek” mini-tours are available throughout the week. History walks, focusing on topics of various historical themes, are offered regularly during warm weather months. All tours and history walks may be arranged at other times by appointment. Check our website, send an e-mail, or call for additional information.

Office and Museum Store: The organization’s business office and the museum store are located in the Monroe House; open Tuesday through Saturday from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. and at other times by appointment. The museum store includes a unique assortment of Oberlin history-themed books and mementos.

Oberlin Heritage Center Resource Center: Our library is open by appointment only and features an array of reference materials relating to Oberlin’s history including genealogical information on early Oberlin families, historic house inventories, and building preservation resources. Some research services also are available for a fee.

Publications: Members receive the Oberlin Heritage Center’s annual report, advance notices of special events and upcoming programs, and they also may opt to receive our E-Gazette newsletter on a monthly basis. Funding: The organization is funded by memberships, contributions, endowment income, investments, grants, special projects and planned gifts. Foundation supporters include the Community Foundation of Lorain County, The Nord Family Foundation and Nordson Corporation.

Members: At the heart of the organization are some 725 individual, family, business and organizational members from Oberlin, across Lorain County, and throughout the country. Endowed life members have made a special lasting gift to our endowment that provides on-going operating support. Members receive free admission to OHC's historic sites tour and neighborhood history walks, a reduced rate on any program for which there is a fee as well as discounts at the museum store, and additional benefits at history museums around the country through the Time Travelers Network. New members are always welcome.

Staff: The organization's staff includes Executive Director Pat Murphy, Assistant to the Director Mary Anne Cunningham, Business Manager Bethany Hobbs, Collections Assistant Prue Richards, Education and Tour Coordinator Liz Schultz, Museum Housekeeper Deloris Bohn, and student interns. Linda Gates and Peggy Loescher (Receptionists) are part-time staff members funded through Mature Services, Inc.

Volunteers: Over two hundred volunteers of all ages and backgrounds assist in many ways including giving tours, doing research, helping with events, working in collections care and cataloging, serving on committees, taking photos, gardening, assisting with public relations and more. New volunteers are always needed.
