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## The Quilt as Story Teller

Textiles can tell a story of their time by fiber type, dye method and printed or woven pattern. Quilts can add to the story through design details, both regional and personal, and the crafter's construction techniques and level of skill with a needle. And when the name of the maker is known – and some family genealogy, associated place, and especially pictures are added – the quilt goes beyond being simply a voice to being a whole conversation! The quilt becomes the vehicle for keeping a family story going for generations into the future. Join us **Tuesday, June 5 at 7:15 p.m.** for an illustrated presentation by the Oberlin Heritage Center's Collections Assistant, **Prue Richards**, featuring examples of quilts from the OHC collections and the stories they hold within them. ## Oberlin is Your “Quilt Connection” this Summer!

“Quilt Connection 2012” is taking place throughout the community in conjunction with the Firelands Association for the Visual Arts' (FAVA) 15<sup>th</sup> biennial juried *Artist as Quiltmaker* exhibition at the New Union Center (39 South Main Street) running through July 29. Plan your Oberlin visit in June to coincide with the special “**Quilt as Story Teller**” guided tour at the Oberlin Heritage Center. This special 60-90 minute tour takes place in the Monroe and Jewett Houses and features some of OHC's historic quilts (c. 1830 to c. 1920) rarely seen on display. Quilt tours will be offered on **Fridays at 10:30 a.m.** and **Saturdays at 3 p.m.** from **June 8 through 23**. Collections Assistant **Prue Richards** discusses textiles and techniques of construction, and the makers, owners, and occasions associated with a variety of wonderful examples ranging in size from small doll quilts to impressively large full-size bed quilts. Information about how to care for quilts will be available at the end of the tour. Space is limited to 10 people per tour and reservations are required. \$10 per person; \$6 per OHC member. ## Teen Camp Looks at Museums “Behind the Scenes”

The Oberlin Heritage Center and Allen Memorial Art Museum are teaming up to offer “**A Week at the Museums**” camp for teens the week of **June 25-29 from 9:30 a.m. to 3 p.m.** Perhaps you've wondered “Where does all of this stuff come from?” when you've entered a museum, or “How do they choose what goes on the wall?” as you look around the gallery. This is a great opportunity for kids to go beyond the public spaces and learn about daily operations by talking with museum staff, trying activities just like the pros, and working on a mini-project that friends and family can see at the end of the week. Perfect for youth wanting to learn more about museums and careers in art and history. I've (even) sewn my shoes back together once!* Liz continues on her journey through the first half of June and returns to the Heritage Center mid-month. Congratulations to Oberlin College associate professor of history and African American studies (and Oberlin Heritage Center member) **Renee Romano** who has published a co-edited collection, *Doing Recent History: On Privacy, Copyright, Video Games, Institutional Review Boards, Activist Scholarship, and History that Talks Back*. The book features her essay “*Not Dead Yet: My Identity Crisis as a Historian of the Recent Past*,” which explores the methodological and disciplinary challenges of researching and writing histories of events that have taken place within the last two decades.

Oberlin Heritage Center Volunteer of the Year (and recent Oberlin College graduate), **Tim Krumreig**, keeps racking up the awards this year. Tim was honored by the College's Bonner Center for Service & Learning with the “Spirit of the BCSL” Award at its End-of-Year Celebration last month.

**Stephanie K. Meeks**, President of the **National Trust for Historic Preservation**, recently delivered a keynote address at the Heritage Ohio Preservation and Revitalization Conference in Toledo. She commended the preservation work being done in our state that is transforming communities and making them not just places to live, but places to *love*. The central message of her speech focused on the power of preservation to drive positive social change. “We have a compelling story to tell about the connection between preservation and the very real social issues facing us as a nation today, from job creation to affordable housing to sustainable communities,” stated Meeks. And how exciting to see a photo of Oberlin's West College Street accompanying Meeks' illustrated presentation! Downtown Oberlin was designated as a National Register Historic District in 2003 with the nomination being prepared by the Oberlin Heritage Center.
