CWRU History Offers Insights into the Development of the Western Reserve

Richard E. Baznik presents the story of the challenging, yet oh-so-fruitful merging of two respected northeast Ohio institutions of higher learning in **Forever Young: The History of Case Western Reserve University**. Western Reserve College, the first permanent college founded in the Western Reserve of Connecticut in 1826, was a product of the dreams and aspirations of regional leaders who had to temper their religious goals to deal with the politics of the times. Nearly six decades later, and 26 miles northwest of the college's home in Hudson, Leonard Case, Jr. left funds to create a school of applied science in Cleveland. It may have been inevitable that the two institutions would get together one day, but it wasn't easy. The story of the schools' eventual consolidation also offers insights into the development of the broader region. Baznik is Vice President Emeritus for Public Affairs at Case Western Reserve University and presently serves as University Historian for CWRU and also is a Trustee of the Oberlin Heritage Center. Baznik's new book *Beyond the Fence: A Social History of Case Western Reserve University* reflects more than ten years of research and writing. The illustrated program takes place on **Tuesday, April 21 at 7:15 p.m.** in Heiser Auditorium at Kendal at Oberlin (600 Kendal Drive) and is free and open to the public.

What's What with S.W.O.T.s?

Last month, 60 of OHC's members and friends came together in four focus groups to discuss the organization's Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities and Threats as an initial step in developing a new five-year strategic plan for the Heritage Center. Comments from the brainstorming sessions were organized within broad areas of operations, including human resources, collections, educational programs, buildings & grounds, governance, public/community relations and funding. The discussions underscored areas of strength (such as talented staff and a strong volunteer network), weaknesses (building accessibility, inadequate directional signage, and lack of space for collections and programming), opportunities (expand programming for young adults; use emerging technologies to reach out to more distant audiences) and threats (find ways to address misperceptions about the organization in some markets of the community). OHC Board President **Nick Jones** led a session at the Oberlin Public Library on March 21 attended by 25 people which summarized the information gleaned from the early-March S.W.O.T. sessions. Second Annual Hubbard Prize Awarded at Regional National History Day

Three Oberlin High School students took home the Oberlin Heritage Center's **Hubbard Prize** at the National History Day Ohio District 3 competition that took place **Saturday, March 27** in Cleveland. The prize was created by OHC members **Gail and Ned Hubbard** of Centreville, Virginia in honor of his grandparents, Pliny Deane and Laura Rote Hubbard, who were the second owners of the Heritage Center's historic Jewett House and resided there from the mid-1920s to the 1960s, before the historical society acquired the property. The award is designed to recognize student historians who live in Lorain County and present an outstanding paper, documentary or website project. This year's recipients **Hannah Cipinko**, **Angela Mavrigh** and **Cat Mavrigh** created a website on Rosalind Franklin and her contributions to the understanding of DNA. The project, titled "Picture 51: The Untold Legacy of Rosalind Franklin" advances to National History Day's state level competition April 25 at Ohio Wesleyan University in Delaware, Ohio. The students will attend the OHC Annual Meeting on April 1 and have a chance to meet the Hubbards who

will be in attendance as well. The team will be available to talk one-on-one with interested Annual Meeting guests prior to dinner.

Oberlin High School student **Lucy Cipinko** also will attend the Annual Meeting and be available to share some of what she learned in writing her National History Day paper on Mary Church Terrell, one of the first African-American women in the nation to earn a bachelor's degree (from Oberlin College in 1884). Lucy also advances to the NHD state competition next month. Congratulations to all the young local historians and to their advisor, Oberlin High School teacher (and OHC Trustee) **Donna M. Shurr**.
