Cleveland Goes Modern

Cleveland architect, **Anthony Hiti**, discusses mid-century modern residential architecture in northeast Ohio in “Cleveland Goes Modern,” presented at Kendal at Oberlin’s Heiser Auditorium on Tuesday, January 19, at 7:15 p.m. Hiti’s illustrated program focuses on the time period 1930 to 1970 and features the work of several architects who introduced the innovative spirit of modernism to the Cleveland area and exposed the region to radical ideas in floor plan, facades void of historical ornamentation, new building materials and energy efficient design. Anthony Hiti is a principal of **Herman Gibans Fodor, Inc. – Architects (HGF)** of Cleveland. He may be a familiar face to some Oberlinians as he was HGF’s principal-in-charge for several recent improvements to Kendal at Oberlin including the Phase I and II cottage expansions, dining room renovation and expansion, Buttonbush covered walkway and Marketing addition. His presentation is based on the *Cleveland Goes Modern* exhibit organized by the Cleveland Artists Foundation in 2007 at the Beck Center for the Arts in Lakewood, Ohio. The event is free and open to the public.

Award categories include:

- Heritage Guardian Award – to be given to an individual or group dedicated to the ideals of conservation and preservation and who serves the community as a leader in preserving Oberlin’s history, historical records, or historic buildings.
- Teacher of the Year Awards – to be given to area educators who inspire students to get involved in history, historic preservation, or community service.
- Keep Oberlin Beautiful Award – to be given to an individual, business, or organization that helps to enhance the aesthetics and appearance of the community.
- Oberlin Heritage Center Volunteer of the Year Award – to be given to a volunteer who makes extraordinary contributions of time and talent to the Oberlin Heritage Center.
- Business Leader Service Award – to be presented to a business that provided exceptional support to the Oberlin Heritage Center in contributions and/or contributed services during the past year.
- Youth Community Service Award – for a young person who makes extraordinary contributions of time and talent to the Heritage Center.

Previous awardees, current Oberlin Heritage Center trustees and paid staff members are not eligible for awards. Downloadable entry forms, which include a listing of previous award winners, are available on our [website](#).

Deadline for submitting a nomination is February 2, 2010. Award recipients will be notified in March and will be invited to attend the Oberlin Heritage Center’s Annual Meeting in April to receive their awards.

Please welcome: **Claire Baytas**, a sophomore majoring in Comparative Literature and Mathematics; **Chloe Pak Drummond**, a third-year student at the College and the Conservatory working on a double degree in Biology and Piano Performance; **Eli Goldberg**, a sophomore majoring in Archaeological Studies and Classics with a Chemistry minor; **Tim Krumreig**, a sophomore majoring in Geology; **Rachel Luczkowski**, a sophomore majoring in Art History, and **Daniella Polyak**, a senior majoring in History. Claire, Eli and Daniella are working with Prue Richards on several collections care endeavors including a 1930s Dollhouse project that involves developing a furnishings restoration and preservation plan as well as an exhibit plan for not only the dollhouse but for many other old-fashioned dolls and toys that are part of the Heritage Center's historic collection. Chloe is working on several research projects with Liz Schultz and Pat Holsworth, while Tim and Rachel will be working with Pat Murphy and other OHC staff learning about museum management, issues concerning preservation in the green movement, and more. The Winter Term interns, along with several of the OHC staff, Board, and docents began the year with a "field trip" to the world-renowned McKay Lodge Conservation Laboratory in Oberlin to learn more about art conservation. Interns also will spend a day this month with Steve McQuillin, of Westlake, to learn more about his work as a historic preservation consultant.

A Splendid New Look for the Monroe House Front Parlor

As you enter the front doors of the Monroe House your eyes will feast upon the marvelous restoration-in-progress taking place in the **Front Parlor**. The new look is the result of long hours of research by Collections Assistant Prue Richards who combed through Julia Monroe's papers and receipts housed in the Oberlin College Archives to put together a plan based on Julia's known preferences for color and style, meshed with the most fashionable interior design trends of the late 19th century. The Heritage Center's Collections Committee worked hard to determine how the plan would be implemented and funded. Much of the work was done by staff and volunteers, with materials and additional paid services underwritten by private donors. Kudos to **Scott Broadwell (Broadwell Painting)** and **Tim Cowling (Creative Carpentry)** for donating many hours of their professional time and expertise to the project. Next steps in the "re-do" include reproducing the original parlor fireplace tiles and hearth to their original finery. Stay tuned for details on how you can get involved!
