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College Historians Explore “Do Roots Matter?”

Oberlin College Archivist **Ken Grossi** and fellow college historians **Tom Mach** and **John Oliver** examine relationships between founding values and present day ideals at three Midwestern institutions of higher learning in an event co-sponsored by the Oberlin Heritage Center and the Oberlin College Archives. **Do Roots Matter? Change at Three Religion-Born Schools – Cedarville, Malone, Oberlin – from the 19th to 21st Centuries** takes place on **Wednesday, February 26 at 7:15 p.m.** at Kendal at Oberlin’s Heiser Auditorium (600 Kendal Drive). Dr. Thomas Mach serves as Professor of History and Chair of the Department of History and Government at Cedarville University in Cedarville, Ohio. John W. Oliver, Jr. is an Emeritus Professor of History at Malone University in Canton, Ohio and the author of *J. Walter Malone: The Autobiography of an Evangelical Quaker*. The program is free and open to the public.

Plan now to attend the **Annual Meeting and Banquet** on **Wednesday, April 9 (5-8:30 p.m.)** at the Oberlin Inn (7 North Main Street). The program presented by OHC Board members, staff and volunteers will feature selected stories and celebrates the Heritage Center's forthcoming oral history-based publication ***Bonnets to Boardrooms: Women's Stories from a Historic College Town*** compiled and edited by **Eugenia Poporad Vanek** with the assistance of many volunteers. You will hear first person stories about the tremendous changes in women's lives over the course of the 20th century and also enjoy fun glimpses of life in our community in earlier eras. Be inspired by the determination in their words, the keen observations made during tumultuous times, and the hope they carried for the future. The Annual Meeting also includes presentations of the Oberlin Heritage Center's **13th Annual Community Awards** and a brief OHC business meeting. Teaching History "Outside the Book"

The Oberlin Heritage Center's History Education Programs are designed to supplement textbook learning and provide students with engaging hands-on experiences, thought-provoking dialogue, and links between past and present to encourage a better understanding of their lives today. **Field trips** to the Heritage Center for guided tours or themed history walks are great ways to "step back in time" and make history come alive. Or, let *us* visit *you* with a **classroom program** that includes discussion, object exploration and a learning activity. Topics include the Underground Railroad and Abolition, the Civil War, Historic Foods, Architecture, Fashion, Games and "History Mystery" objects. If you prefer an opportunity for more in-depth study of a topic, consider renting a new **history kit** designed in accordance with Ohio social studies and many common core standards. Teachers can rent a kit for two weeks and build on the learning experience by pairing it with a field trip or requesting a museum staff member to introduce the kit topic to students with a story, discussion and activity. Each kit contains books, hands-on objects, primary and secondary source documents, a vocabulary list, and a teacher's activity guide. Kits are available for grade levels 1-5, and grade 8. All Education Outreach opportunities are low-cost and can be tailored to enhance specific school lessons and meet academic content standards. Each week-long themed camp is held at the Oberlin Depot (240 South Main Street) and takes place from 9:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Mark your calendars now for these upcoming dates and register early when forms are available later in the spring. This year's camps include:

Oberlin Expedition (July 28 – August 1) Each day we'll visit different museums, businesses, landmarks, and institutions in Oberlin to see what goes on behind the scenes and see the people, and machines, that make the town run.

World Cultures (August 4-8) Join us for an exploration of people around the world, including their music, dance, food, and history.

Architecture (August 11-15) Learn the basics of buildings and explore local architecture. Use your creativity to draw, construct, and engineer.

History, Hiking and a Healthy Dose of Friendly Competition!

Gather family and friends and go for the gold in this new learning adventure for adults or teens. The **Amazing Oberlin Smartphone Race** combines local history with technology and teamwork. Reservations are available from April through October (you can schedule a date now), Tuesdays through Saturdays between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. The two-mile, 90-minute experience is easy, fast-paced, and fun. *How does it work?* Ideally, two teams (with 2-4 people each) begin at the Heritage Center and are texted the first clue leading them to a landmark in Oberlin. When a team figures out an answer, they send a text or a photo back and receive the next clue. Anyone can play, although each team needs at least one player with a Smartphone to send and receive texts and photos. An OHC member can book a race for their group for \$20; a nonmember can do the same for \$25. Contact Museum Education and Tour Coordinator **Liz Schultz** to schedule your date and start time; the sooner you schedule, the more likely your date will be available. (Racing on days when the Heritage Center is usually closed may be possible by appointment for an additional fee.)
