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A Visit with Antoinette Brown Blackwell

Oberlin native **Beth Marshall** portrays Antoinette Brown Blackwell (1825-1921), the first woman to be ordained a minister of a recognized denomination in the United States. The costumed historical presentation takes place **Wednesday, April 24 at 7:15 p.m.** in **Kendal at Oberlin’s Heiser Auditorium** (600 Kendal Drive). Blackwell studied theology at Oberlin College and with her friend and future sister-in-law Lucy Stone, she organized the first debating society for college women. Blackwell became a Congregationalist minister, and later, a Unitarian minister. Ms. Marshall, ordained a Unitarian minister in 2003, presently serves as Parish Minister at the First Unitarian Church of Toledo. The event is free and open to the public.

“Great Unveiling” Preservation Project Underway at Vineway

The Oberlin Heritage Center staff and Board will begin some exciting preservation work in coming weeks at 82 South Main Street (the Vineway building, which houses The Mandarin and Lupita’s restaurants and The Bridge technology center, an outreach of the Oberlin Public Library). Work gets underway the first weekend of April (weather permitting), when OHC volunteers, with the professional guidance of local carpenter **Pat Ives**, will gently remove the vinyl siding from the main facade and south side of the building to reveal the original brick exterior and large display windows. Preservation architect **Lorri Sipes** follows up the next week to assess the condition of the building sans siding and help OHC continue to devise a rehabilitation plan that will create an attractive and more historically accurate presence on Main Street. The Vineway building was built in 1933 to house the H.G. Klermund Ford Dealership (photo from a 1933 *Hi-O-Hi* Oberlin College yearbook). In her initial assessment of the building last year, Sipes found the underlying structure to be “a gem of mid-century architecture, waiting to be uncovered.” Business continues as usual at The Mandarin, Lupita’s and The Bridge as the work progresses. Stop by for a close-up look at this preservation-in-action project.



History Walk Docent Training

The **Freedom’s Friends History Walk** training takes place **Sunday April 14 (1-4 p.m.)** and offers volunteers an opportunity to learn about Oberlin’s role in the history of abolition and the Underground Railroad. The **Scholars & Settlers History Walk** training follows on **Sunday, April 28 (1-4 p.m.)** and

focuses on Oberlin's earliest residents and the triumphs, debates and scandals linked to the landmarks around Tappan Square. The **Sneak Peak: Oberlin Origins** tour training on **Saturday, May 4 (12-2 p.m.)** concludes our spring schedule. Oberlin Origins is a new 30-minute mini-tour of the first floor of the Monroe House. Training is free, and each session begins at the Monroe House (73½ South Professor Street). The rule allows many investors 70½ or older to transfer as much as \$100,000 a year from an individual retirement account directly to a qualified charity without having to pay income taxes on the money.
