## **Oberlin History Comic Book Shines in Ohio Museums Association Competition**

*Oberlin: Origins and Onward!* the history comic book created by **Bentley Boyd** and published by the Oberlin Heritage Center in December 2011, was honored recently with a Visual Communication Award presented by the **Ohio Museums Association**. Since 1984, the OMA has recognized creative excellence in printed and digital publications by bestowing “Gold” and “Silver” awards in six categories based on organizational budget size. The Heritage Center received the “Silver” in the open competition, and **Liz Schultz**, the Oberlin Heritage Center’s Museum Education and Tour Coordinator, was on hand to accept the award at the Ohio Museums Association’s annual conference held in Cincinnati in mid-April. ## **The Creative Magic (and Hard Work!) Behind the Oberlin History Comic Book**

Historian and author **Bentley Boyd** visits Oberlin in late May to talk to students and the community and provide the inside scoop on how he wove almost 200 years of Oberlin history into a fun and colorful 24-page comic book appealing to all ages. The creator of more than 30 history comic books in his Chester Comix series, Boyd’s unique style engages readers and sparks their interest in various aspects of American history. The public is invited to meet and greet Bentley Boyd at a **book-signing at Oberlin’s Ben Franklin/Mindfair Books** (13 West College Street) on **Tuesday, May 22** from **3:30 to 5:00 p.m.** followed by a **free community program at 7:15 p.m. in Kendal at Oberlin’s Heiser Auditorium** (600 Kendal Drive). Earlier in the day, Boyd plans to stop by Prospect School and visit with third-grade students as they learn more this semester about Oberlin’s nationally significant history. A copy of *Oberlin: Origins and Onward!* will be provided to each of the students later this year (and for many years to come) when making their annual visit to the Heritage Center’s Little Red Schoolhouse in the spring as a culmination of a unit of study on local history. Funding for the comic book was provided by generous donations to honor the memory of Oberlin Heritage Center trustee Nicholas Stevenson.

**The Quilt as Story Teller**, presented on **Tuesday, June 5 at 7:15 p.m.** at Kendal at Oberlin's Heiser Auditorium. Collections Assistant **Prue Richards** discusses how quilts tell stories using historic quilts from the OHC collection. Free and open to the public.

**Quilt as Story Teller Tours**, offered on **Fridays at 10:30 a.m. and Saturdays at 3 p.m.** for three weeks only from **June 8 – 23**. This 90-minute guided tour features some of the Heritage Center's rarely exhibited historic quilts on display at this time. Fee is \$10 per person; \$6 per OHC member. **The 1940 Census – National Service Project** seeks volunteers to help Index the 1940 U.S. Census and make the "Greatest Generation" available to all on-line, free-of-charge. Last month, the National Archives released the Digital Images for the 1940 U.S. Census to the general public. Unfortunately, the images were indexed only by Census tract (i.e., neighborhood) and State. This means that to find someone in the Census record you must know where they were living when the Census was taken. The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints has begun the task of Indexing the 1940 U.S. Census Record, but significant manpower is required to complete this project by the end of 2012. It's simple and fast work; batches are small and can be completed in about 30 minutes. Volunteer at least 1 hour per week; start by going to [www.FamilySearch.org](http://www.FamilySearch.org)

**May is National Preservation Month!** Since 2005, the **National Trust for Historic Preservation** has celebrated National Preservation Month to encourage the celebration of our nation's rich, diverse heritage and historic structures. This year's theme is "*Discover America's Hidden Gems.*" Take some time this month to explore significant places that help preserve our nation's stories, or volunteer to assist with a community preservation project. Applause, applause to the committed citizens in Geauga County, Ohio who are working to preserve the **South Newbury Union Chapel** on State Route 44. Sometimes referred to as the "Cradle of Equal Suffrage" and "Free Speech Chapel," this "Hidden Gem" recently was listed on the National Register of Historic Places for standing as a beacon for the women's suffrage movement and other progressive era ideals.
