Voices of the Tribe

It's always a beautiful day for baseball...and **Tuesday, August 18** is no exception! Local historian **John Mercer** offers a fun historical perspective on America's favorite summer pastime when he presents **Voices of the Tribe: Cleveland Indians Broadcasters from the 1920s to the 1990s**. The program takes place at Heiser Auditorium, Kendal at Oberlin, beginning at 7:15 p.m., and it is free and open to all. Mercer will share stories about Cleveland baseball's radio broadcasters from the beginning of radio broadcasts to the present day. You'll enjoy hearing about all of the Cleveland Indians' major radio voices including such legendary figures as Herb Score, Jack Graney, Pinky Hunter, and Tom Manning. Mercer's illustrated program includes a few favorite original audio broadcasting excerpts as well, and promises to offer plenty of fun and nostalgia for all! John Mercer is an Oberlin resident, a member of the Oberlin Heritage Center, and an Olmsted Falls High School teacher and Ph.D. candidate at Kent State University.

The Waning Days of Summer are a Great Time to...

...Exercise your mind and body with a leisurely-paced history lesson. Reserve your spot on one of the Oberlin Heritage Center's History Walks led by trained volunteer docents. Taking place now through October 31, the **Tappan Square History Walk** is offered on the First Friday and Third Saturday of the month, and the **Freedom's Friends History Walk** takes place on the Second Friday and Fourth Saturday. All History Walks begin at 11:00 a.m. and last approximately 75 minutes. ...Plan a field trip to the Heritage Center's Little Red Schoolhouse for students, scout groups, youth groups, or the small fry at a family reunion. Make a reservation to experience **Lessons in the Past**, a 90-minute educational and fun program reflecting a typical school day in the early 1800s. Guests are welcomed by a costumed interpreter and immersed in historic school lessons including reading, penmanship, arithmetic, and more. Games and fun are mixed among the lessons, and weather permitting there even will be time for "recess" and old-fashioned diversions on the schoolhouse lawn. Advance reservations are required, with a fee of \$3 per child, while chaperones may attend free of charge. workshop **Be a Good Ancestor Workshop; Collecting and Preserving Your Family History, Stories, Photographs and Artifacts**. Offered at the Oberlin Depot on **Wednesday, October 14 from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m.**, this two-part workshop is a great way to learn from the pros, Oberlin Heritage Center staff members **Pat Holsworth** and **Prue Richards**. A morning session will address proper care of artifacts, documents, textiles and photographs. An afternoon session will provide guidance on genealogy and oral history. Lunch and an optional half-hour individual follow-up consultation with either of the presenters are included in the price for the all-day workshop which costs \$55 (\$50 for Oberlin Heritage Center members). Registration for either the morning or afternoon session is also available for \$35 (\$30 per members) plus \$10 should you wish to have lunch with the presenters and attendees.
