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An Evening with Frederick Douglass

Dramatist and educator **Wesley Williams** offers a compelling first-person performance as civil rights activist, orator, and author Frederick Douglass in a program hosted by the Oberlin Heritage Center on **Wednesday, October 28 at 7:15 p.m.** Douglass was born a slave in early 19th century Maryland, escaped at age 20, and became perhaps the most recognized name in the American abolitionist movement. He was a lifelong friend of Oberlin professor and diplomat James Monroe, whose home is now the Heritage Center's headquarters and the starting point for the organization's well-received early Oberlin history tours. Williams gives his audience an opportunity to experience Douglass's life, famous speeches and a powerful interpretation of how this well-known American abolitionist's prolific words speak to humanity in the 21st century. The one-hour dramatic production takes place at Kendal at Oberlin's Heiser Auditorium (600 Kendal Drive) and is free and open to the public.

OHC Co-Hosts Lorain County Preservation Showcase

All are invited to learn about recent and ongoing efforts to preserve Lorain County's local heritage when the Oberlin Heritage Center, in conjunction with the Lorain County Preservation Network, co-hosts the annual Lorain County Preservation Showcase on **Saturday, October 17, from 11:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m.** Local historical societies and preservation organizations from across the area will offer mini displays in the community room of the Oberlin Public Library (65 South Main Street) to spotlight their recent preservation activity and ongoing history projects. In addition, the **Special Collections Department at Oberlin College Library** (Mudd Library, 4th Floor, 148 West College Street) will share simple solutions for preservation by demonstrating how they make archival containers for books. The department's book repair area also will be open to the public. The **Oberlin Heritage Center** will provide drop-in sneak peek tours of the first floor of the 1866 Monroe House, along with a special display of recent acquisitions showing how OHC preserves history beyond the stories told through its historic buildings and furnishings. Behind-the-scenes tours (approximately 20 minutes) of the museum's collections storage area will be available at 11 a.m. and 2 p.m. All activities are free and open to the public. Collections Manager **Maren McKee** welcomed **William (Bill) and Bonnie Hubbard** of Colorado for a special tour of the Jewett House last month. More than 50 years prior, Bill had visited the house often (then referred to as "Two Elms") as it was the long-time residence of his grandparents, Pliny Deane and Laura Louise Hubbard. The elder Hubbards purchased the house from Frank and Fanny Jewett in 1926 and resided there on South Professor Street for the next 40 years. The Hubbards raised three sons, one of whom was William Hubbard's father, Alfred. Although Bill's last visit to the house was in 1964, as soon as he stepped through the front door, many warm memories came rushing back, and Maren busily took notes to add to OHC's knowledge and interpretation of the house's history. Did you know that Pliny Hubbard, a civil engineer employed by the New York Central Railroad, was also a weaver?! His grandson clearly remembered that an upstairs bedroom was used as a loom room! Mary, who grew up near Warren, Ohio, has a BA in Art History and French from Case Western Reserve University and a MA and Ph.D. in Art History from Rutgers University (New Brunswick, NJ). She has internship experience in a number of art museum

settings (Cleveland Museum of Art, Smithsonian American Art Museum and the Museum of Contemporary Art in Cleveland) and is looking forward to applying her talents and interests to the realm of history museums in the months ahead.
