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## Ring in the New Year with Appreciation



The year 2015 ended on several high notes for the Oberlin Heritage Center! In November, OHC received notification that **Nordson Corporation** would give \$4,500 to support education programs and a new summer position for a local high school student. In December, **The Community Foundation of Lorain County's Jane and Eric Nord Fund** approved a grant of \$25,000 to support operating costs. And by the end of the year, OHC topped its \$40,000 **Annual Fund** goal with the support of more than 300 donors! Combined, this represents about 20% of the Heritage Center's annual budget for 2016. What do donors make possible? Children hearing inspirational stories about individuals who challenged stereotypes. New residents discovering the history of their houses. Business owners sharing their history with patrons. Letters and photographs being rescued from permanent damage and

loss. College students creating a home-away-from-home through service and learning. Families enjoying a fun day together. Researchers finding new leads. Museum professionals exchanging ideas for best practices. Volunteers continually learning and connecting. ## Great City, Great War: Oberlin's Response to World War I

The Oberlin Heritage Center launches its 2016 calendar with a newly researched and illustrated presentation focusing on the area's early 20th century history. AmeriCorps/Ohio History Service Corps member **Mary Manning** brings to light many important, intriguing and inspiring Oberlin connections to events that occurred during the First World War. Town and College alike had aided relief efforts to the Allied Powers since the war's beginning in 1914, and when duty called in the spring of 1917 as the U.S. entered the "Great War," Oberlin did not hesitate to send its finest young men and women to the battlefield. Manning traces the experiences of Oberlinians who went to war, examines how questions of race and gender influenced their military service, describes how those who stayed at home



supported the continuing war effort, and much more. The program will be presented at the Oberlin Public Library (65 South Main Street) on **Saturday, January 16 at 2 p.m.** and repeated at Kendal at Oberlin's Heiser Auditorium (600 Kendal Drive) on **Wednesday, January 20 at 7:15 p.m.** The presentation is free and open to the public at either location.

## Collections Care and Preservation Basics



Come learn about the do's and don'ts of basic collections care and ask questions of an industry expert! This introductory workshop for students, local history staff/volunteers, and members of the general public, will introduce participants to museum standards, agents of deterioration, and the solid science behind preservation practices. Presented by **Jennifer Sours Chevraux**, the interim Executive Director and Education Outreach Officer of ICA-Art Conservation, this program is co-sponsored by ICA-Art Conservation, the Oberlin Heritage Center, and the Ohio History

Service Corps (funded by ServeOhio, Ohio's commission on Service and volunteerism). The event takes place on **Wednesday, February 3 from 10:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m.** at the Oberlin Public Library (65 South Main Street). Although the workshop is free, registration is required. *Straus the deer, which graces the front lawn of the Heritage Center's 1866 Monroe House, was manufactured around 1880 and first stood in the yard of prominent Oberlin businessman Marx Straus. It was donated to the Heritage Center in 2001 and extensively restored as a community service by McKay Lodge Fine Arts Conservation Laboratory of Oberlin. Over time, many family photos, personal memories and anecdotes featuring this cast iron stag have been shared throughout the community, proving the deer is and forever shall be a valued Oberlin resident.*
