Did you know that the *first* woman to run for President of the United States, as a candidate in the newly formed Equal Rights Party in 1872, was from Ohio? **Anne McEvoy** of the Lakewood-based nonprofit **Women in History** (www.womeninhistoryohio.com) performs as Victoria Woodhull, a colorful and controversial woman whose many interests included spiritualism, women's rights, free love, and high finance. Needless to say, Woodhull's life was often surrounded by scandal. The 30-minute performance is followed by a question-and-answer session with McEvoy, a produced playwright, director and actor in Northeast Ohio. The program takes place in Heiser Auditorium at Kendal at Oberlin (600 Kendal Drive) and is free and open to the public. Come for a behind-the-scenes look at the Oberlin Heritage Center's 1866 Monroe House to celebrate the 150th anniversary of this remarkable building! Ohio Open Doors initiative taking place all over the state from September 9-18, with historic sites hosting special tours and activities to celebrate the 50th anniversary of the National Historic Preservation Act, signed by President Lyndon B. Visit the headstone of the man who escaped from slavery (twice!) and later served on the Oberlin village council. \$6 per adult; free to OHC members, college students, and children under 18 accompanied by an adult. George Wingard, Program Coordinator at the Savannah River Archaeological Research Program, visits Oberlin in a special community event co-sponsored by the Heritage Center and the Oberlin College Department of History. *Discovering Dave* is the story of an enslaved potter in early-19th century South Carolina who acquired the rare skills of reading and writing. Wingard co-produced the the award-winning 2013 documentary *Discovering Dave - Spirit Captured in Clay* which pieces together Dave's remarkable

life and artistry. Following the 49-minute film, there will be an opportunity for asking questions and for examining one of Dave's original pots. The program is free and open to the public and takes place at Hallock Auditorium in the Adam Joseph Lewis Center for Environmental Studies (122 Elm Street). "That must be some kind of a record," she told the Times, "and all I used was a ten-cent spring trap." The guy who builds that "better mouse trap" will have to make it doubly good, now!
