Tuesday, March 14 at 7:15 p.m.



Oberlin Heritage Center Trustee, retired Oberlin High School band instructor, and Army veteran **Steve Johnson** will present a two-part series this spring about World War II and its local impact. This first program focuses on Oberlin's reactions to the war and its precursor events as told through newspaper accounts, oral histories, and social programs created during the war years. (A follow-up program takes place on May 9 and focuses on the stories of local men and women who served.) 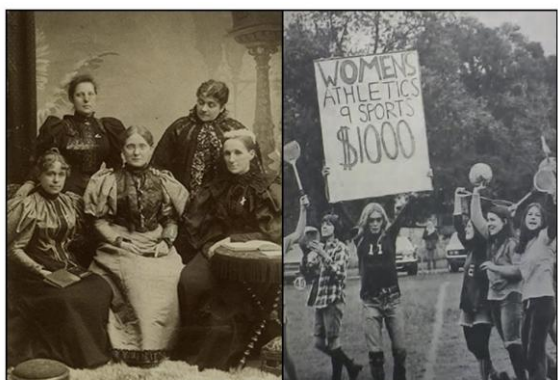


will lead adventures through the lands of the Arctic Peoples, Australia, West Africa, India and more!

## **Celebrate Women's History Month**

### **Oberlin Women's History Walk / Saturday, March 25 at 10:30 a.m.**

In 1883, on the occasion of Oberlin College's 50th anniversary celebration, Lucy Stone, a well-known crusader for equal rights and a member of the College's Class of 1847, urged her alma mater to take *one step more* in the fight for justice. The Oberlin Heritage Center's **One Step More: Oberlin Women's History Walk** is a 90-minute guided tour in and around downtown Oberlin that shares stories and images of Stone and other Oberlin women who made a difference in efforts to gain rights and respect. The tour fee is \$6 for adults; free to OHC members, any college student and children under 18. Reservations required.

## History-in-a -Minute

### Early Oberlin African-American Activism

Recently, AmeriCorps member **Mary Manning** prepared a series of Facebook posts focused on black citizens of Oberlin speaking out for their rights, including this post:

African-American activists with Oberlin connections numbered among the earliest members of the NAACP at its founding in 1909, and some also helped, in 1905, to found the Niagara Movement (*see founders' photo at left*), its immediate and more radical predecessor that envisioned a “mighty current” of change for the world. Mary Burnett Talbert (OHS 1883 and OC 1886), then living in Buffalo, helped to pave the way for the initial 1905 meeting in nearby Fort Erie, Ontario, and she hosted movement leaders like W.E.B. DuBois (*pictured in middle row, 2nd from right*) in her home. In 1906, they held their Second Annual Meeting at Harpers Ferry, WV, and Henrietta Leary Evans, sister

to Lewis Leary and aunt to John Copeland, the Oberlinians who died in John Brown's raid, gave a stirring address to the crowd. In 1908, the Niagara Movement held its Fourth Annual Meeting in Oberlin, with assistance from a Northeast Ohio committee that included Oberlin residents Mrs. Blanche V. Jones and Henson Tuck. Peter Pindar Pease might be more widely known as the first settler of Oberlin, but his brother Hiram was equally noteworthy, both for his sense of humor (which was scarce in early Oberlin) and his staunch belief in full racial equality. Hiram's descendant, **Caleb Heineman** of Brooklyn, NY, stopped by the Heritage Center while visiting Oberlin with his wife and daughter, who is previewing Oberlin College. Thanks to a generous contribution by **Nordson Corporation**, the Oberlin Heritage Center was able to provide free programming to all of the 4th graders in the Lorain City School District. Museum Education and Tour Coordinator **Amanda Manahan** visited all 10 of the Lorain Elementary schools during Black History Month and interacted with some 375

students. The program *Northern Ohio and the Underground Railroad* featured stories about slavery and abolitionists in the United States and included activities to help students think critically about the struggles and difficult choices the freedom seekers faced. In the photo at left, Larkmoor Elementary students hold up sack drawings, which they did as an activity to think about what three items they would take with them if they had to travel on the Underground Railroad.

AmeriCorps member **Mary Manning** must have cloned herself last month to accomplish so much in and around the region! She trained history volunteers in Vermilion to use collections archiving software, digitized collections items at the Lakewood Historical Society, updated the Brownhelm Historical Association website, reviewed the Lorain Historical Society's tour resources, checked-in on the Cleveland Grays Armory Museum's ongoing self-assessment, and created a mini history exhibit for Mercy Allen Hospital in Oberlin. She also took part as a workshop presenter at Youngstown State University's "History Across the Humanities" conference, where she spoke to undergraduate and graduate students on "Marketing Yourself and Your Historical Projects." Somewhere along the way Mary also found time to write a book review of the *Anarchist's Guide to Historic House Museums* (by Franklin D. Vagnone and Deborah Ryan) for the current issue of *The Local Historian*, the newsletter of the Ohio Local History Alliance. Whew! Mary is one of over 800 AmeriCorps members serving in the nation, and one of 13 Ohio History Service Corps members stationed throughout Ohio and tasked with assisting local historical groups with projects, programs, volunteer recruitment, and self-assessments.

OHC Executive Director **Liz Schultz** and Lorain Historical Society Executive Director **Barb Piscopo** will attend Ohio's Statehood Day together on March 1 at the Statehouse in downtown Columbus, joining history leaders from all over Ohio to advocate for local history projects and education. The two have meetings planned with Ohio's 56th District State Representative **Dan Ramos** and Ohio's 13th District Senator **Gayle Manning** to bring the officials up to date on recent successes in Lorain County history organizations as well as future challenges.

A warm welcome goes out to Oberlin College student intern **Linda Diaz** who is volunteering at the Heritage Center this semester as a component of her Comparative American Studies Field Based Research course. Linda will be helping with oral histories and also learning about the administrative side of nonprofit and museum management.
