




Holiday Hours at the Heritage Center

Oberlin's Indigenous Peoples' Day Committee hosts Part Two of the film series *We Shall Remain: America through Native Eyes*. The film "**Tecumseh's Vision**" tells the story of the (Ohio) Shawnee leader Tecumseh and his brother, Tenskwatawa, known as the Prophet. In the years following the American Revolution, the Prophet led a spiritual revival movement that drew thousands of followers from Native American tribes across the Midwest. His brother, Tecumseh, in the course of his brief and meteoric career, became one of the greatest Native American leaders of all time, orchestrating the most ambitious pan-Indian political and military alliance ever mounted on the North American continent. After his death he would live on as a potent symbol of Native pride and pan-Indian identity.
