

The Oberlin College Department of History hosts the national traveling exhibit **Courage & Compassion: Our Shared Story of the Japanese American World War II Experience** from mid-February to mid-March in the College's Richard D. Baron '64 Art Gallery in downtown Oberlin. 

Over 100 people registered for the three public meetings hosted by the Oberlin Heritage Center last month as part of the preparation for a new strategic plan. Facilitator Leslie Yerkes, founder of the Catalyst Consulting Group in Cleveland, guided pairs of participants as they informally interviewed one another about what the organization does well and how its strengths can provide momentum for the future. "This was actually quite fun!" seemed to be the overall consensus from volunteers as they parted ways following each of the 75-minute sessions that were held in

varied locations throughout the community. In coming weeks, the OHC planning team will compile and review all of the responses from each session and begin preparing a new plan that builds on OHC's strengths and sets targets for meeting community and organizational needs over the next five years. ## History Minute

### Oberlin African-American Women in Business



Dating back to its earliest decades, Oberlin has benefited from and been shaped by the entrepreneurial spirit of African-American citizens. We often remember and recount key businessmen such as Wallace Pettiford, John Watson, and Thomas Gayters, but what about the women who also provided vital services? Women such as Caroline Burnett, who maintained a boarding house and restaurant on Main Street during much of the second half of the nineteenth century? Or Marie DeFrance, a single black woman who operated her own millinery shop from 1896-1926? Then there was Annie Mason, a hospitable, hardworking, and business-savvy woman who opened the popular Mason's Tea Room (at left is an ad from the Oberlin Review, November 17, 1922). And perhaps you knew Gigi Jones, a pioneer female barber who was skilled and admired by

many in Oberlin and Elyria. ## OHC By the Numbers

### Tour Visitation Increases 23% in 2017



The number of tour visitors increased in 2017 to **2,782**, a new high total driven up by significant increases in group tours through the year. Group tour visitation increased by nearly 32% over 2016 statistics and by nearly 52% over 2015! Walk-in tour numbers stayed fairly consistent over the same time period. About one-third of all tour visitors came from nearby communities in Lorain County; 17% came from the Cleveland area, and 9% from other places within Ohio. A little over one-quarter of all tour visitors traveled from out of state. Oberlin-resident tour visitor numbers rose last year to 15% (up from 10% of all tour visitors in 2016). Travelers came to the Heritage Center from 42 states plus Washington, DC and Puerto Rico. Docents welcomed global visitors from Australia, Canada, China, England, Germany, India, Netherlands, Scotland, Taiwan, and Uganda.

OHC is grateful for volunteer docents who are tremendous ambassadors for the organization and the community. Volunteers led about one-third of all tours in 2017, with the rest being led by student interns/AmeriCorps members and staff.

## Collections Corner

### Frank Jewett's Pocket Watches Visit Local History "Roadshow"



Oberlin Heritage Center Executive Director **Liz Schultz** jumped at the invitation offered by the Solon Historical Society for the public to bring in their family clocks and watches to be assessed by volunteers from the Lake Erie Chapter of the National Association of Watch and Clock Collectors (N.A.W.C.C.). The free event offered an opportunity to find out more about two pocket watches owned by Professor Frank Jewett, whose 1884 Queen Anne style home is part of the Heritage Center's collection. OHC records indicated that a silver watch (which we thought to date to around 1860) belonged to Frank's father, Dr. Charles Jewett, who gave it to his son to use during his college days at Yale University. A gold pocket watch (ca. 1880) was carried by Frank Jewett until he moved to Hawaii. The timepiece specialists confirmed the date of the silver watch to the Civil War period, and also noted that at some point in time it had been re-cased. They thought it would likely work if we had a key to start the watch. The experts also confirmed the date of the gold watch to the late 19th century and suspected it might need a new gear to get it running again. The information

gleaned from the N.A.W.C.C. added new details to what is known about these two special artifacts in the OHC collection.
