



Heritage Center Celebrates Jewett Family Day

26th Annual Family Fun Fair and Jewett Family Reunion – August 4



The Oberlin Heritage Center celebrates "family" during the community's annual Family Fun Fair by shining the spotlight on its 1884 Jewett House, the home's first residents, Frank Fanning and Sarah Frances Gulick Jewett, and their ties to other Jewetts on the family tree. Special guests for the day will include members of the national association of the Jewett Family of America (JFA) and others interested in the history and lineage of the Jewett Family, whose roots in this country span nearly 400 years. Festivities take place within and around the Victorian Jewett House (73 South Professor Street) and are free and open to the public. The line-up includes:

10 a.m. to 4 p.m. - Old-fashioned games on the lawn of the 1836 Little Red Schoolhouse.

10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Self-guided tours of the first floor of the 1866 Monroe House.

11 a.m. "I Spy Oberlin" walking tour, designed especially for younger children (ages 5-11) accompanied by an adult. Reservations encouraged. Location: Departs from the Monroe House.

2 p.m. Mini-program about Frank and Fannie Jewett who lived in the house from 1884-1923. The Jewett family has connections to national events and social movements particularly in the Civil War era. Discover the Jewett ties to Harriet Beecher Stowe's 1852 anti-slavery novel *Uncle Tom's Cabin*. Learn about Jewetts who served as officers in the 54th Massachusetts regiment, the first African-American company in the Civil War.

Following the program, guests will be invited to view newly installed history panels about Frank's extended family and tour the house at their own pace. Location: Jewett House.

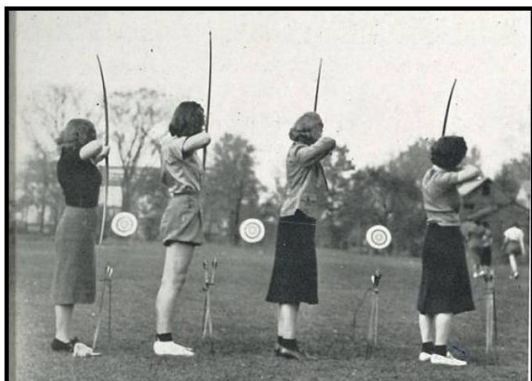
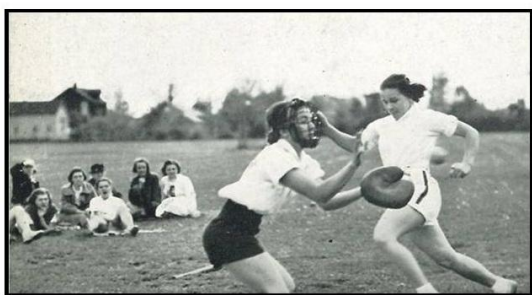

Graham served as an Ohio Local History Corps/AmeriCorps member at the Oberlin Heritage Center during the 2013-2014 year and created OHC's "One Step More: Oberlin

From Private Sphere to Public Sphere: A History of Early 20th Century Oberlin Women

Tuesday, August 14 at 7:15 p.m.



Ohio History Service Corps/AmeriCorps member **Sara Fisher** explores how the rise of physical education -- locally influenced by Oberlin College's Delphine Hanna and Gertrude Moulton -- intersected with reinvigorated women's social movements in the early 20th century. Fisher will provide a historical glimpse into women's public activities in Oberlin that, along with the rise of physical education, proved to have a lasting impact on the community's history and on larger social and health-related initiatives across the nation. Fisher is completing her second year as an AmeriCorps member, having spent her first year at the Quaker Heritage Center in Wilmington, Ohio.

The Heritage Center also will salute Kendal at Oberlin's 25th Anniversary year and the positive influence that the Kendal community has had on the ongoing work of the

local nonprofit. OHC's Assistant to the Director **Mary Anne Cunningham** will precede Sara Fisher's women's history program, presenting a 15-minute illustrated tribute with highlights from Kendal's involvement in the Heritage Center's development and growth over the past quarter-of-a-century. Cunningham, coincidentally, has served on the Heritage Center staff for the past 25 years as well.

Peek Through the Portal, September 29 at 11 a.m. A history of the people, structure, and artwork associated with the original Oberlin Conservatory building, Warner Hall, which sat on the space occupied today by the King building (corner of College and Professor Streets) and was replaced in the early 1960s by the present-day Conservatory building across the street. This 60-minute outdoor conversation is led by volunteer **Sid Comings**, with assistance from **Bruce Colbert** and **Katherine (Kitty) Denny-Smith**. History Minute **A History Drive-By**



Liz Schultz gave a mini history program about the first automobiles in Oberlin at the Vintage and Vintner gathering on July 24. Here are a few highlights from that presentation for those of you who weren't able to attend:

The first automobiles rolled through Oberlin in 1899. According to the *Oberlin News*, "They were in too much of a hurry for the newspaper men to ascertain from whence they came or whither they were bound." Another newspaper revealed that the two cars were on their way from Cleveland to Chicago. One of the drivers was Alexander Winton himself, inventor and

manufacturer of the Winton automobile. His business partner, Thomas Henderson, later lived in Oberlin on State Route 511.

Dr. H. W. Pyle was the first Oberlin resident to purchase and use an automobile, a Stanley Steamer. "The Doctor will use it for pleasure and in his professional calls when the roads are good."

In the early years, it was nearly impossible to drive an automobile on Oberlin roads in the winter.

By 1903 an ordinance had been passed regulating the use of automobiles. "No person shall propel or drive any automobile upon any street or avenue in said village at any rate of speed exceeding eight miles per hour."
