This year marks the 16th anniversary of one of Oberlin's favorite summer events, Chalk Walk! On Saturday, June 24, from 10 a.m. until 4 p.m., local and regional artists will create imaginative chalk drawings throughout downtown Oberlin. Volunteers will be on hand to provide free materials and visitors of all ages can add their own artwork to the sidewalk gallery.

Oberlin Chalk Walk is a collaborative event organized by Allen Memorial Art Museum, Firelands Association for the Visual Arts

(FAVA), Oberlin Business Partnership (OBP), Oberlin Heritage Center, and Oberlin Public Library.

Master artists for this year's event are Wendy Mahon, Héctor Castellanos, and Dan Cherney. Local artists include Keith Joe Dick, Joseph Toothman, Karly West, and Beth Wolosz. Saturday, June 17, from 9:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m.



This year, Juneteenth will be held at the George A. Abram Pavilion on Edison Street. Juneteenth programming will include an opening prayer by Elder Reverend Nevels, a reading of the Emancipation Proclamation by Oberlin College alum Donnay Edmund, and comments by Dr. Mary Ann Harris. Children's activities and a live DJ will be offered all day along. Food vendors and other vendors will be on site for the celebration.

The Juneteenth Parade will take place at 12:00 noon beginning at Spring Street Park and moving along Pleasant

Street to the Roundhouse and the Pavilion on Edison Street. The parade will feature a band led by Oberlin College alum Daniel Spearman, horsemen, a clown, candy, dancers, and other fun features.

The Maafa commemoration will be held at Westwood Cemetery in Oberlin from 6:30 pm to 7:30 pm. and will have an opening prayer by Elder Laurence Nevels. Shirley Chambers will lead those assembled in a selection as she has for the last five years. Daniel Spearman plays the trumpet for 'Lift Every Voice and Sing.' There will also be a moment of silence to recognize the passing of Ms. Linda Isabell (May 28, 1947 - January 13, 2023).

This event is hosted by Juneteenth Oberlin.

OHC Seeks AmeriCorps Member for the 2023-2024 Year







The Oberlin Heritage Center has been chosen as a host site for an Ohio History Service Corps/AmeriCorps member for the 2023-2024 program year. The selected participant will be able to dedicate half of their time to projects at the Oberlin Heritage Center, and will spend the other half assisting history organizations in the region. Members commit to a full year of service from Sept. 13, 2023 - Aug. 31, 2024. Benefits include a living allowance (\$20,000), health insurance, eligibility for childcare assistance, professional development, and the ability for members to place qualifying student loans into forbearance for the duration of their service term. Additionally, members who successfully complete 1700 hours of service will receive an education award the equivalent of a Pell Grant (\$6,895).

To Apply: This program is managed by the Ohio History Connection in Columbus, OH (please visit https://www.ohiohistory.org/americorps for more information). In order to be considered for the position, all prospective members must apply through the MyAmeriCorps website. Paper or email applications will not be accepted. Application Deadline: August 15, 2023, or until position is filled. Reviews and interviews begin immediately, so early applications are strongly encouraged. About the Project:

1858. When slave catchers threaten to kidnap John back into slavery, a crowd of hundreds of Oberlin and Wellington citizens led by a revolutionary group of Rescuers prevent his capture and speed him on to his quest for true freedom. Based on actual historical events, the inside story of "the little town that started the Civil War."

On-Erie Beach Article (https://greenbookcleveland.org/locations/on-erie-beach/)

Please enjoy this fascinating article on Green Book Cleveland about the On-Erie Beach, which may have been the only Black owned and operated beach in northeast Ohio and was a popular tourist destination in the 1930s. Research about On-Erie Beach is also being conducted by the Lorain Historical Society.

Early on, On-Erie Beach was sometimes referred to as "Erie-on-the-Beach," one of a string of various names it acquired over the years. The beach was intended as a "summer colony," an exclusively African American summer resort, with various privately owned cabins on site. The loss of public transport, gasoline rationing and travel restrictions during World War II contributed to On-Erie Beach's decline and it was largely disused by the 1950s.
