

An Introduction to Redlining in Oberlin, Ohio

Tuesday, October 17 at 6:30 p.m.



OHC has developed a program examining the history of redlining in Oberlin and the Oberlin Public Library will be hosting it Tuesday, October 17 at 6:30 p.m. Redlining is the discriminatory practice in which services, often financial services like loans, are withheld from neighborhoods often occupied by minorities, low-income, or otherwise marginalized groups. It is also a term used to describe many forms of housing segregation.

Film Screening of "A Higher Law" at Oberlin High School Thursday, October 5 at 7:00 p.m.

Oberlin High School will be offering a free screening of "A Higher Law: The Oberlin-Wellington Rescue of 1858" on Thursday, October 5 at 7:00 p.m. The Rescue was a key event in the history of abolitionism leading up to the Civil War, when a group of 37 men were charged with violating the Fugitive Slave Act of 1850. This is the first time that a 'higher law' defense was used in a federal court case.



This screening is free and open to the public, no registration required. We were also pleased that Oberlin middle and high school students were able to view the documentary with support from Harriett Thomas and the J.B. Thomas Fund, Oberlin City Schools, Oberlin College, and the Apollo Theatre.

Indigenous Peoples' Day Celebrations- Monday, October 9 & Saturday, October 14

Join the Indigenous Peoples' Day Committee of Oberlin for the 7th annual Indigenous People's Day Vigil from Noon to 1:00 p.m. at the corner of Tappan Square near the site of the historic elm. This vigil is for people to come together in remembrance and celebration of indigenous cultures and resilience and is a moment to honor the rich history, traditions, and contributions of indigenous peoples.



Festivities will be featuring hoop dancer Malcolm McDonald of the Gun Lake Tribe Band of Pottawatomi. All are welcome to join in this meaningful public event.



There will also be a Community Celebration on Saturday, October 14 from 12:00 - 4:00 p.m. at the Oberlin Enrichment & Activity Center on 36 S. Prospect St. Celebrate the vibrant cultures and heritage of Indigenous peoples at his special event which will feature a variety of activities and performances.

Words, Music, Memory: (Re)Presenting Voices of the Holocaust

Curated by Adina Langer, an Oberlin College alum and a curator at the Kennesaw State Museum of Holocaust History and Education, <u>"Words, Music, Memory: (Re)Presenting</u> <u>Voices of the Holocaust</u>" is a ten-panel traveling exhibit and accompanying digital gallery guide highlighting the links along the chain of commemoration that connect past to present and generation to generation.

While the panels focus on the words of writers who witnessed the Holocaust, the gallery guide includes biographies of the writers, sketches by the panel illustrators, information about musical and dramatic pieces adapted from the writers' works, and interviews with composers, lyricists, performers, and producers. Visitors also have opportunities to access performance videos and share their perspectives. The exhibit will be on display at Terrell Library of Oberlin College from the beginning of October through November 18.

On Thursday, November 16, Adina will also be giving a <u>lunchtime talk</u> about curating histories of violence and resilience. That same evening, there will be a <u>concert performed</u> by Oberlin alum Sheena Ramirez of music based on the writings of young people who witnessed the Holocaust at 7:30 p.m. at the Kulas Recital Hall. Native Plant Seeds Available

The grounds and pollinator garden of OHC are home to several native Ohio plants, and these plants are starting to produce seeds. We welcome people to come harvest seeds at their convenience. The walnut trees near the brick intersection and back toward the pollinator garden (located behind the Monroe House) have been dropping fruit and nuts. Quick tip for collecting walnuts: bring gloves and a container you don't mind getting stained!



The pollinator garden is still flowering, but ultimately coming to its seasonal end. Currently, the following plants are ready to have seeds harvested: swamp milkweed, swamp rose mallow, and the purple and gray coneflowers (see pictures). The larger, common milkweeds have pods but need a little more time to fully develop.

If you plan to harvest seeds from the pollinator garden, please observe the following:

- Do not step into the raised garden beds to harvest from the plants.
- Bring a pair of clean scissors and clip the seed pods/heads at their base. Do not pull or cut further down the stems. Do not try to take clippings of plants.
- Harvest only 2-3 seeds pods/heads per plant in order to leave enough for others.

Please note that these native pollinator seeds require <u>stratification</u> and may take a couple of years to become established.
