Community Action to Save Strays, Inc.

Community Action to Save Strays, Inc. or CATSS, is a non-profit, Trap-Neuter-Return organization dedicated to preventing births of stray cats and improving the lives of those cats who have no home.


Why spay and neuter?

Cats reproduce very quickly. A single unspayed female can have offspring of between 100 and 5,000 in seven years.

CATSS volunteers foster, care for, and find homes for many abandoned cats. But Oberlin has lots of feral (wild) cats as well. CATSS controls feral cat populations by a program called Trap-Neuter-Return (TNR). Feral cats are trapped, neutered, given vaccines and medical treatment, then returned where they were found. Colony managers visit once a day to insure that the cats have food and water, and to check for any sick or injured cats that need medical attention.

This is accomplished by providing emergency shelter along with comprehensive support services while homeless families seek permanent housing.


ealing Companions

Healing Companions, Inc., provides funding to meet the growing demand for psychiatric service dogs (PSDs) by training shelter dogs as PSDs and placing them with people with mental illness, thus helping both dogs and humans lead more productive, independent lives.

Donations are needed to pay for expenses associated with acquiring, training, and veterinary care for psychiatric service, as well as educating the public and professionals about psychiatric service dogs. Donations will also be used to implement scientific research to demonstrate how PSDs impact the lives of those who are severely limited in their abilities to function due to mental illness.

The Community Meal feeds an average 25 - 30people each evening, with numbers higher towards the end of the month when other supports, such as food stamps, run out. In many cases the meal a diner receives at the Community Meal is the only healthy and nutritious meal they will receive all day. Local Community-Based Energy Efficiency Program

Make a difference with POWER: Improve the energy efficiency of homes in Oberlin, help your neighbors and friends save money on their utility bills, and fight climate change locally. POWER administers a grant program to fund insulation and air sealing in low-income Oberlin homes and assists Oberlin residents in applying for additional resources to improve the energy efficiency of their homes. In the past two years, POWER has:

- Insulated 16 homes of low-income Oberlin families *free of charge*
- Saved five homeowners a combined \$992 on their utility bills (reduced natural gas bills by up to 27%!) and prevented the emission of at least 7,263 lbs of CO₂ in winter 2009-10 (based on data from five homes insulated in winter 2008-9)
- Infused over \$35,000 into the local economy, through contractor supplies and labor, at a time when the construction industry has been suffering financially
- Received a Sustainability Initiatives Award from American Municipal Power (AMP) for innovative collaboration with Oberlin Municipal Light & Power System (OMLPS)
