Join friends old and new at the Oberlin Heritage Center for this family-friendly (and FREE!) event featuring live performances, a historic portrayal, old-fashioned games, exhibits and best of all -- root beer floats for everyone! Why root beer? Throughout most of its history Oberlin was a "dry" town, meaning you couldn't buy alcohol within city limits. Times have changed but a fondness for this summer treat hasn't. The floats are generously provided by Oberlin IGA, while free popcorn is made possible by the Oberlin Athletic Boosters Club and Bethany Hobbs.

- Outdoor music by "Parsh," a band featuring Tom Somsak, Craig Zacharyasz Dave Mann Wolf, Rick Hetsko, and Dave Parsh.
- 1:30 and 2:30 p.m. "Storytime with Mrs. Evans" in the Little Red Schoolhouse. Dr. Camille Hamlin Allen will portray Sarah Jane Leary Evans and share stories of her family and their home still standing at 33 East Vine Street. Each free mini-performance will be ticketed to ensure social distancing within the Schoolhouse.
- Historic games at the Little Red Schoolhouse for the young and young-at-heart.
- The return of a popular antique phonograph demonstration by OHC Trustee Fr. Brian Wilbert.
- A display of vintage cameras, arranged by OHC Communications Coordinator Steven Rice.
- Free self-guided tours of the 1866 Monroe House.



This September, OHC is offering our **Radicals & Reformers walking tour** on Saturdays at 11:00 a. m.

This guided tour promises a pleasing balance of Westwood's scenic landmarks and stories of some of the many spirited men and women of Oberlin who simply refused the status quo. Find out which resident was remembered as "gentle, soft-spoken, tolerant and yet nobody's fool." Visit the headstone of the man who escaped from slavery (twice!) and later served on the Oberlin village council. Note: this tour begins at the entrance of Westwood Cemetery (Morgan St.).

“Celebrating 100 Years: Latino History in Lorain” special exhibit

The Oberlin Heritage Center and Oberlin Public Library are excited to host the guest exhibit "Celebrating 100 Years: Latino History in Lorain, Ohio." The exhibit, created through a partnership of El Centro, the Lorain Historical Society, and Oberlin College, highlights the initial work of the Latino Lorain History Project and features photographs and oral histories, particularly focused on the history of Vine Avenue in Lorain. The exhibit will be available for viewing any time the Oberlin Public Library is open between September 24 and October 8, which also falls during National Hispanic Heritage Month. Interactive elements will be incorporated for people to share comments and connect with the Oberlin Heritage Center to share memories about Oberlin Latino history as well.



Wilson Bruce Evans Home Historical Society Annual Meeting

The WBEHHS will be hosting its annual meeting and gathering on Saturday, September 17. Everyone is invited to hear an update about the organization, enjoy a historical re-enactment of Sarah Jane Leary Evans by Dr. Camille Hamlin Allen, take a self-guided tour of Evans family gravesites in Westwood Cemetery, and celebrate awards being conveyed to Linda Robinson Isabel, Sandra Madison, Marlene Merrill, and Kurt Russell. Reports will include exciting developments with the building and plans to turn it into a museum and educational center that will memorialize the Evans family and honor the African American experience in Oberlin and beyond. It will also celebrate the National Park Service designation of the home as a site on the National Underground Railroad Network to Freedom and its naming to the National Park Service African American Civil Rights Network.

\$10,000 Grant to OHC from Lorain County Commissioners



OHC Business Manager Bethany Hobbs and Communications Coordinator Steven Rice were on site at the recent awards ceremony held by the Lorain County Commissioners to distribute American Rescue Plan Act funds to local nonprofits. OHC was awarded a \$10,000 grant from the program by the Lorain County Commissioners.

The funds will be primarily used by OHC to help upgrade our phone systems with any remainder slated to go toward restoration and maintenance projects that arise over the next year.

Frank Jewett's Hair Removal Product


One of OHC's summer interns, Emily Winnicki, released a blog in early August covering one of the stranger pieces of ephemera to be found about former owner of the Jewett House, Professor Frank Jewett.

Apparently the professor and chemist invented and marketed a women's depilatory product named "Flash" that vowed "Superfluous Hair Removed WITH it's Roots in a FLASH". The product was marketed in the early 1920s and developed by Jewett at the age of 77. Eventually a second depilatory would arise in Oberlin named "Enzit" in 1926, developed by Philip H. Ohly.
